"Send Annie" (21 Oct 1865 - Letter from Fr Woods to Mary MacKillop) Reflection by Anne-Marie Wilkinson



"I believe my daughter Annie was called by God to be a companion and helper to many people" Flora MacKillop

It was wonderful to be able to share some of my research on Annie MacKillop at the last webinar JCoLT held to celebrate our Companions Day. After spending a little time exploring the painting by Brain Dunlop of Mary MacKillop & Annie that we had used on the flyer, I focused on how Annie had been a companion to Mary, her family and the Sisters of Saint Joseph.

With the death of baby Alick in 1857 (the year before Annie was born) and the birth of three siblings after her, Annie ended up being the 'middle' child with three older siblings and three younger ones. And in the end, she was to outlive all her MacKillop siblings.

A tribute written after her death said... "A notable link with the past was snapped when, on the first Friday of 1929, Miss Annie MacKillop passed away in her 82nd year. To a mind acquainted with the Catholic history of this continent, ... it might well seem that far too little notice has been taken of the event, and that far too commonplace a farewell was given on the departure from earth of one who must ever be remembered in connection with Australasian Catholic history. ... as on account of the strong light reflected on her by the leading personalities and doings that went to the building up of the Institute of St. Joseph.

...she had much of the clear common sense that distinguished Mother Mary, and something of the impressionable and impulsive character of her Jesuit brother. She was more humorous and light-hearted than either, having a keen eye for the oddities of life and a great capacity for amusing others. She was, an agreeable musician; could invent games, and write a letter that could extort a smile from the most gloomy and depressed souls."

With her family Annie was the entertainer, communicator and carer. In her own letters Annie said that many an evening she sat at the piano playing whilst her family tried out the latest dancers. She was also known to encourage her siblings as they played tricks on their big sister Mary. Annie was a keen letter writer, and these were often filled with news of what other members of the family were doing. She was also physically present for them, travelling many miles especially if support was needed and this included being at their bedside when they died.

Mary encouraged Annie to get her teaching certificate at a young age (15yrs) so she could join her as an assistant teacher in Portland in 1863. And it was to there that Fr Woods in 1865 requested Mary 'send Annie' to Penola as the regular teacher had married and there was no replacement. Annie made her way to Penola on her own and remained there working once Mary & Lexi arrived in 1866. Lexi took the little girls, Annie took Jnr boys in a backroom of the cottage and gave music lessons, took the choir & played music for the religious education sessions, whilst Mary had the older children. Annie said Fr Woods and Mary tried to encourage her to join the order but she did not believe she was pious enough for convent life. However, she spent much time in convents all over the country helping out as new schools were opened. She would give piano lessons to help raise funds. Mary even sent her to North Adelaide in 1897 to train some of the young sisters in how to teach music. Annie not only assisted and supported Mary in her work and mission, but she was her close companion which included travelling to New Zealand with her and she was often Mary's carer in times of ill health.

Her assistance and companionship of the Sisters of St Joseph continued even after Mary's death in 1909, until her own death on the 14 Jan 1929, at St Joseph's Home in Carlton, Victoria, where she was living with the Sisters.

Long after her death the front room was still referred to as 'Annie's room'. Apart from her name, birth & death dates on her headstone it simply says;

'Sister of Mary MacKillop. Friend of the Sisters of St Joseph'. Annie truly shared the Josephite charism.
