

Love one another as I have loved you...

Holy Thursday, an important day in Holy Week, is sometimes referred to as Maundy Thursday, Maundy being derived from the Latin Mandatum meaning command.

John the Evangelist is the only recounter who relays this intimate encounter that Jesus had with his apostles in the Upper Room. John tells us that Jesus astoundingly took off his outer garment and insisted that he wash the apostles' feet. True to form, Peter wasn't having any of this and resisted. Over the years we've heard Peter's eventual reply "Wash not only my feet but my hands and head as well". (Jn 13) There is no doubting blundering Peter had enormous love for Jesus and showed his deep allegiance.

It is only after the washing that we hear Jesus give the Mandatum to the group: "I give you a commandment. Love one another as I have loved you". This message is integral and central to this event and is used as the response to the reading at Holy Thursday Mass.

Richard Rohr comments that he is amazed that Jesus did not make foot washing a sacrament. He goes on to say that Jesus "wanted to give a theology of the Eucharist that revealed the meaning behind the breaking of the bread. He made it into an active ritual of servanthood and solidarity, instead of the priestly cult that it has largely become... So Jesus has to insist on being the servant lover. Thank God, Peter surrenders, but it probably takes him the rest of his life to understand."

Jesus, surrounded by his close companions, was troubled and lonely. He knew that he also was rubbing shoulders with his betrayer. He gave them Eucharist and added the second Mandatum: "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to

you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me" (1 Cor 11)

Holy Thursday, the celebration of the Passover, is now celebrated as a new passing over as the mysteries of this night invite us to review our own need to change, to be faithful, to realise that we have a source of life in our very midst because Jesus had the courage to face the challenges that led to his eventual transformation. He left himself for us; he demonstrated servant leadership and showed us how to love.
