VALE SR CARLA CURRAN


Sr Carla Curran was a beloved member of the Sisters of Saint Joseph of the Sacred Heart. As we reflect on her life, we give thanks for the remarkable woman she was, a woman whose faith, dedication, and love left a deep and lasting impact on all who had the privilege to know her. Sr Carla was born in 1929 and as a young woman worked as a dressmaker before enlisting in the Royal Australian Navy. When her naval service was finished, she entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph and was professed in 1961. She devoted herself to living the charism of Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop, whose spirit of compassion, service and faithfulness guided her every step. Her life was a testament to the mission of Mary MacKillop and in many ways she embodied the very essence of Josephite spirituality.

Sr Carla had a deep thirst for life — a hunger to explore the unknown and bring the love of God to remote and often lonely places. She carried the Good News to places as far as China and throughout outback Western Australia, as a member of the Motor Missions team, always accepting the life God offered her with an open heart and a willingness to serve. Whether in the hustle of city life or the quiet of the countryside, Sr Carla was always ready to respond to the needs around her, bringing her unique gifts wherever they were most needed.

For 18 years Sr Carla served as the Coordinator of the Josephite Associates (Companions), a role she took on with remarkable passion and dedication. During this time she was praised for her outstanding enthusiasm and tireless energy. Sr Carla fostered an environment where each person could grow in relationship with God and one another.

Even after retiring from this formal leadership role, Sr Carla continued to be a faithful companion to many, remaining an active presence in the lives of those around her and offering mentorship and guidance. Sr Carla's visits to Companion groups, her simple faith, and her genuine interest in others were a source of great strength and encouragement. Her welcoming presence made all who met her feel seen, heard, and valued. She had a remarkable ability to connect with people from all walks of life, and she shared in their joys and struggles with a spirit of generosity and grace.

Her vision was one of hope — a hope that was expressed through her acts of loving service. She was alert to the signs of God's presence in the world and committed herself to sharing that presence with others. Her gentle spirit, her good humour, her reflective nature and her devotion to family were a source of light to all. She had an uncanny ability to listen attentively, to offer words of wisdom, and to gently lead others in their own spiritual journeys.



Sr Carla's life was one of profound faithfulness. She lived each day in service to God and others, and she did so with a joy that was infectious. She brought warmth, kindness, and a quiet strength to all who knew her.

In her presence, we were reminded of the power of simplicity, the beauty of faith, and the importance of walking with one another on the journey of life.

As we mourn her passing, we also celebrate her life — a life that has touched us deeply. We are richer for having known Sr Carla. Her legacy lives on in the countless lives she touched, the communities she helped to form, and the example she set of living a faith-filled, joyful, and generous life.

Sr Carla, you have now entered into eternal peace with your God. May you rest in the loving arms of the One you served so faithfully. We thank you for your leadership, for your friendship, and for the many ways you made this world a better place. You will be deeply missed, but we take comfort in the knowledge that you now enjoy the reward of your labour in the presence of your Creator.

LAUDATE DEUM—A CALL TO ACTION

At the October Gathering, Josephite Companions participated in a workshop entitled Laudate Deum A Call to Action. Information provided assisted Companions to further develop their understanding of the Sisters of Saint Joseph's *Embrace*, *Explore*, *Embody* initiatives. They explored what it means to be true stewards of creation and by extension, the environment. The video clip,

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eyOb3HlkGFg_introduced the topic and underlined the urgency around the climate crisis. A radical shift in our attitudes and in our actions is required. Participants were given the opportunity to express and discuss their responses and it was

obvious that climate change and the perceived inaction of those in power are uppermost in the hearts and minds of many.



Pope Francis' Laudato Si was revisited, emphasising that the environmental crisis is a moral and faith based issue. This urgent call for action is supported by scientific data that indicates that human activity is driving global warming and environmental destruction. Companions were reminded that the call for action parallels the broader tradition of Catholic Social Teaching

Care for God's Creation: Respect for the environment is central to the Church's moral framework. It is seen as a part of respecting human life and dignity.

which provides a framework for addressing social, economic, and environmental issues.

Option for the Poor: Climate change exacerbates inequality. The Church calls for a preferential option for the poor, whose lives are most affected by environmental destruction.

Solidarity: Catholics are called to act in solidarity with all people, especially those affected by climate change, advocating for policies that promote environmental and social justice.

GLOBAL INITIATIVES — Prayer, Ecological Restoration Projects, Advocacy in environmental policies, Public Awareness

COMMUNITY ACTION — Use energy efficient systems in the Church, Introduce solar power usage, Clean up events, Participate in campaigns

PERSONAL ACTION — Reduce waste, Conserve water, Lower Carbon footprint, Support biodiversity.

Following on from this presentation, the group looked closely at the Season of Creation 1 September - 4 October—an ecumenical time of global prayer and action. Churches and communities come together to pray, reflect, and take action on environmental issues. This global movement is rooted in faith, reminding us that creation care is a core responsibility for all believers.

We concluded the workshop by looking at the Sisters of Saint Joseph of the Sacred Heart's Explore—Embrace—Embody Conversation package—Laudate Deum and the Urgency of the Climate Crisis.

We will further explore this package in 2025.



EXPLORE - EMBRACE-EMBODY
