Scripture A reading from the Gospel of Luke (Luke 2: 6-11)

Reflection

Reflection

Epíphany



Scripture

A reading from the Gospel of Matthew (Matthew 2:1) After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born King of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him."

Reflection

The journey of the Magi reminds us to seek God's presence in unexpected places. Mary MacKillop encouraged us to "*never see a need without doing something about it.*" Like the wise men, may we have the wisdom to see God's presence and the courage to respond to His call.

For Mary MacKillop and for each one of us there are Epiphany seasons in our lives. These are the times when we experience God-with-us in a new and wondrous way. We have an awakening and we enjoy a sense of God's presence in our ordinary human reality of our lives. In these moments we realise that we are called to live our lives in a normal way and yet to seek ideals which soar above the powers of our mind and sweep even beyond our dreams.
